The Merdeka Award Trust was established in August 2007. The Trust, founded by PETRONAS and Shell, aims to honour individuals and organisations that have contributed in an exceptional way to the people of Malaysia by conferring them the prestigious Merdeka Award.

Open to all living Malaysians, the Merdeka Award is internationally benchmarked and features two main programs: the Merdeka Award and the Merdeka Award Grant for International Attachment.

The Award has been given in areas such as Education & Community, Environment, Health, Science and Technology, Outstanding Scholastic Achievement, and Outstanding Contribution to the People of Malaysia. Additionally, the Anugerah Harapan Merdeka was introduced to recognize rising talents.

Since 2012, the Merdeka Award Grant for International Attachment has supported Malaysians under 35, fostering innovation and international collaboration. The programs aim to cultivate thought leadership and global perspectives, positioning Malaysia as a competitive force in various sectors.

The presentation ceremony has been organized biennially since 2019, alternating between the Award and the Grant.













Making Our Mark





Selecting The Best

The nomination and selection of Merdeka Award recipients are administered by five Nomination Committees and one Selection Committee.

These Committees go through a long and rigorous selection process that reflect the high ideals of the Merdeka Award.

The Committee members are made up of eminent individuals from Malaysia and abroad, bringing with them a wealth of knowledge, experience and expertise to allow them to nominate and select outstanding individuals and organisations who have laboured tirelessly, with great sincerity and conviction for the good of this country and its people.

Committee members will deliberate, examine the merits and finer qualities of each individual or organisation's nomination, and in the end, identify those who have stood above and beyond the rest, in their embodiment of the Merdeka spirit.

Nomination Committee

There are five Nomination Committees, one for each Award category each comprising a minimum of three Nominators except for the Education and Community Nomination Committee which has five Nominators.

The objective and duty of each Nomination Committee is to seek, deliberate, shortlist and recommend eligible candidates for their respective Award category and to submit that shortlist of candidates to the Selection Committee.

Selection Committee

The Selection Committee comprises five Nominators. Their objective and duty is to deliberate the merits of the candidates from the shortlist submitted by the various Nomination Committees and recommend a final list of nominees to the Board of Trustees.

A Literary Luminary of Malaysia

Dato' Seri Dr. Abdul Samad Mohamed Said, often fondly known as A. Samad Said, stands as one of Malaysia's most distinguished literary figures. His work has left an indelible mark on the nation's cultural landscape, shaping generations of writers and preserving the essence of Malay language and tradition through his extensive body of work. His deep engagement in social and political issues and his commitment to promoting Malay culture have earned him a place among the most revered cultural icons in Malaysia.

The Early Years and Literary Impact

Born in Malacca but raised in cosmopolitan Singapore, A. Samad Said's formative years were marked by diverse influences. These experiences, especially the hardships endured during the Japanese military occupation from 1941 to 1945, found their way into his literary works, giving them a unique depth and authenticity. Notable among these are the novels *Sungai Mengalir Lesu* (1967), *Di Hadapan Pulau* (1978), and *Keledang* (1978), which vividly portray the struggles of those times.

His most celebrated work, however, remains *Salina*, published in 1961. This novel, hailed as a masterpiece of Malay literature, has been extensively discussed and reprinted over the years, cementing A. Samad Said's reputation as a literary giant. The novel's profound aesthetic and philosophical values have been lauded by critics, with Singapore's laureate Keris Mas describing it as the first colossal, modern, and universal Malay-authored novel. The special edition reprint of *Salina* in 2021, marking its 60th anniversary, is a testament to its enduring relevance.

Literary Evolution and Exploration of New Genres

His later works, such as *Daerah Zeni* (1985) and *Hujan Pagi* (1987), continued to garner critical acclaim, with the latter being recognised for its seamless incorporation of magical realism—a genre pioneered by Latin American novelist Gabriel Garcia Marquez. In fact, *Hujan Pagi* is regarded as the first Malaysian novel to explore this genre, showcasing A. Samad Said's ability to innovate and push the boundaries of Malaysian literature.

Travel also played a significant role in inspiring his creative endeavors. His month-long sojourn in India in 1965 led to the creation of the novel *Bulan Tak Bermadu di Fatehpur Sikri* (1966), while his brief visits to England and France in 1989 inspired the novel *Cinta Fansuri* (1994), set against the backdrop of Paris. These works, along with *Warkah Eropah* (1991), a collection of letters to his family, reflect the broad range of influences that shaped his literary output.

Journalism and Short Stories: A Prolific Career

In addition to his novels, A. Samad Said made significant contributions to Malaysian journalism and short story writing. He began his journalistic career in 1958 at Utusan Melayu and later served as the Chief of Literary Development at the New Straits Times newspaper group. His short stories, first published in 1954, capture the essence of everyday life in Malaysia, portraying characters such as students, squatters, and the unemployed with a keen eye for social realism.

These short stories were later compiled into a collection titled Hati Muda Bulan Muda: Kumpulan Cerpen 1954-1992 (1993), edited by Othman Puteh. The collection highlights A. Samad Said's ability to depict the struggles and triumphs of ordinary Malaysians, making his work relatable to a wide audience.

Essays and Socio-Political Commentary

A. Samad Said's essays also hold a significant place in his body of work. After stepping down as editor of Berita Harian in 1978, he devoted himself to writing essays, many of which were later compiled into books such as Tangan yang Simpatik: Kumpulan Esei (1981), Antara Bulan dan Wira (1989), and Ilham di Tepi Tasik (2006). These essays delve into issues related to the development of Malaysian literature and the works of both Eastern and Western authors, reflecting A. Samad Said's extensive reading and deep understanding of global literary trends.

His writings often tackle socio-political themes, offering insightful commentary on topics such as identity, colonialism, nationalism, and social justice. Through his literature, A. Samad Said has sparked critical discourse and reflection among readers, using his platform to advocate for positive change and social awareness.

Continued Legacy and Recognition

Even in his retirement, A. Samad Said continued to produce literary works, including poetry collections like Balada Hilang Peta (1990), Al-Amin (2001), and Suara Dari Dinding Dewan (2003). His contributions to the drama genre, such as Lantai J Pinkie (1996), have also been met with critical acclaim, with the play being staged multiple times to enthusiastic audiences.

His influence extends beyond Malaysia's borders, with some of his works being translated into other languages, including Korean and English.

Notably, his poem Gagak Parit (1991) was translated into English as The Dead Crow and included in the Malaysian lower secondary school English literature curriculum, further cementing his legacy as a literary icon.




Interview at Kuala Lumpur International Book Fair 2024

A Lasting Contribution to Malaysian Literature

A. Samad Said's impact on Malaysian literature is profound and enduring. With over 100 of his works now preserved in the Pak Samad Gallery at Universiti Sultan Zainal Abidin (UniSZA), future generations will continue to benefit from his literary legacy. His numerous accolades, including the prestigious Sasterawan Negara (National Laureate) title in 1985, and his recent recognition with The Knights Award 2023, underscore the significance of his contributions to Malaysian culture and literature.

His work continues to inspire and resonate with readers of all ages, ensuring that his legacy will endure for generations to come.



A. SAMAD SAID: PERSPEKTIF PERIBADI

Apakah satu pencapaian yang paling anda banggakan?

Saya fikir kejayaan saya menulis novel yang saya tidak sangka sebenarnya - dia menjadi. Tapi selepas saya dapat pujian, selepas saya dapat hadiah material saya merasa ini seakan satu anugerah yang tak disangkakan dan saya amat besar hati dan berterima kasih.

Setiap kali saya menulis dan menjadi, dan mendapat sambutan yang baik saya merasa itu bukan saja keuntungan bagi saya, keuntungan bagi masyarakat dan juga saya fikir dia menjadi khazanah untuk negara.

Apakah kenangan terbaik anda sepanjang kerjaya anda?

Bagi penulis, saya fikir saya tak sangka saya dapat menghabiskan satu antologi puisi Islami yang panjang Al-Amin – yang lain-lain saya bangga juga tapi tak seperti Al-Amin sebab dia memerlukan seluruh keikhlasan saya, seluruh pengetahuan saya, seluruh keupayaan saya untuk menulisnya.

Apakah cabaran terbesar yang perlu anda hadapi sepanjang pengalaman kerja anda?

Setiap kali saya t<mark>erilham untuk</mark> membuat sesuatu, jikalau dia mengambil masa yang amat lama untuk menjayakannya saya akan merasa risau, tapi sebaik-baik saya mengatasinya saya merasa senang.

Bagaimanakah anda mengatasi cabaran itu?

Cabaran yang terbesar saya gagap sebenarnya!

Jadi dari awal keinginan ingin menjadi great orator. Jadi saya pergi ke tepi ombak laut, saya tunggu ombak besar datang, dia pukul pantai ataupun batu, saya akan menjerit sebolehnya lebih nyaring daripada dia.

Bagaimanakah masa anda dibahagikan antara kerjaya dan kehidupan peribadi anda?

Saya tak dapat nak membezakan sebenarnya sebab bagi saya setiap detik yang berlalu itu amat berguna bagi saya dan kegemaran saya hanya membaca. Jadi di kiri kanan bila ada buku senang hati saya.

Apakah falsafah atau pegangan hidup anda?

Saya kira saya didatangkan oleh Allah - pilihan yang sangat saya hargai.

Dan saya harap kehadiran saya di dunia ini memberi sumbangan kepada bangsa saya dan negara saya.

Saya fikir kerana banyak dalam kehidupan yang saya lalui. Dan kebanyakan ini amat berguna untuk golongan sekarang, jadi setidaktidaknya saya memulangkan apa yang saya alami berharap apa yang saya hantar itu berguna untuk orang lain.

Masing masing mempunyai terjemahannya sendiri, bagaimana kehidupan itu wajib dimanfaatkan dan oleh kerana saya seorang penulis, jadi saya ingin menulis sebaiknya, dan oleh kerana kehidupan saya agak susah jadi pegangan agama saya itu menjadi amat bererti.

Jadi setiap kali saya risau atau apa saya akan membaca kisah-kisah yang disampaikan dalam al-Quran.

Apa yang anda usahakan sekarang?

Sekarang ini saya lebih banyak menghabiskan membaca buku-buku klasik yang tidak sempat saya habiskan. Misalan saya suka baca Dostoevsky, Leo Tolstoy, Hemingway tapi tidak semua habis dulunya, tapi sekarang saya go slow dengan hasrat untuk menikmati dan manangguk dia punya hasil.

A Lifetime Dedicated to Malaysian Performing Arts

Dato' Dr. Faridah Merican, widely known as the First Lady of Malaysian Theatre, is a figure whose influence in the world of performing arts has transcended generations. With a career that began in the 1960s and continues to this day, she remains a household name, revered for her contributions to theatre, television, and film. Her legacy is not just in her performances but also in the platforms she has built, the lives she has touched, and the enduring impact she has made on Malaysian culture.

Early Career and Rise to Fame

Faridah's journey in the performing arts began during a time when Malaysia's theatre scene was still in its nascent stages. Her early roles in iconic plays such as Lela Mayang, Tok Perak, Uda dan Dara, and Alang Rentak Seribu during the 1960s and 70s set the stage for her future contributions. These performances were not just acts of entertainment; they were instrumental in addressing and encouraging discourse on racial, political, and social issues. Faridah's ability to portray a wide range of characters with depth and authenticity earned her widespread acclaim, establishing her as a versatile and powerful force in Malaysian theatre.

The Actors Studio: A Beacon of Malaysian Theatre

In 1989, Faridah co-founded The Actors Studio (TAS), a move that would significantly advance Malaysia's performing arts industry. TAS quickly became a cornerstone for contemporary theatre in the country, providing a platform for actors, directors, and playwrights to showcase their skills and foster artistic innovation. Over the years, TAS has hosted nearly 600 productions, attracting almost 1 million patrons. Its mission to educate individuals of all ages in various art forms has been pivotal in enriching the nation's cultural landscape.

The Kuala Lumpur Performing Arts Centre (klpac): A Platform for Cultural Exchange

The devastating flash floods of 2003, which destroyed TAS's underground complex, could have marked the end of an era. Instead, it led to the creation of the The Kuala Lumpur Performing Arts Centre (klpac) in 2005, driven by Faridah's determination and vision. klpac, a non-profit organisation, has since become a hub for artistic expression, hosting over 2,500 shows and events and welcoming more than 800,000 visitors. The centre's dedication to inclusivity and diversity is evident in its wide range of performances, from Cantonese Opera to Mak Yong, and from Shakespeare in Bahasa Malaysia to contemporary experimental works.

Expanding the Reach: penangpac and Nationwide Impact

Faridah's vision for theatre extended beyond Kuala Lumpur. In 2011, she co-founded the Performing Arts Centre of Penang (penangpac), which played a crucial role in fostering creativity and the arts in the northern region of Malaysia. Penangpac provided a platform for local artists to showcase their talents and for the community to engage with diverse cultural experiences. Although penangpac closed its doors in 2022 due to financial pressures exacerbated by the pandemic, its legacy lives on in the countless artists and audiences it touched during its decade of service.

Mentorship and Advocacy

Faridah's influence extends far beyond her roles as an actor, director, and producer. She is widely recognized as a mentor who has provided numerous Malaysian performing artists with their initial breakthroughs in the industry. Through klpac and other initiatives, she has created nurturing grounds for budding thespians, underscoring her commitment to the growth and development of talent within the Malaysian performing arts community.

Her advocacy for the arts is equally commendable. Faridah has actively championed educational initiatives aimed at fostering a deeper appreciation and understanding of the performing arts among the Malaysian public. Through workshops, seminars, and outreach programs, she engages audiences of all ages and backgrounds, instilling a passion for theatre and cultivating future generations of theatre enthusiasts.

Tackling Social Issues Through Theatre

Faridah has never shied away from using theatre as a platform to address pressing social issues. Her groundbreaking Life Sdn Bhd series has fearlessly delved into topics such as abuse, mental health, and refugee plights. In 2016, Life Sdn Bhd: Human Trafficking shed light on the urgent issue of human trafficking in Malaysia, featuring the participation of both non-actors and actors. Faridah's collaboration with the Malaysian AIDS Council to produce Adam The Musical in 2010 was another significant effort, using the arts to raise awareness about HIV and AIDS, breaking down stigmas, and fostering a deeper understanding of these health issues within the community.

Leadership and Legacy


Despite the challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic, which severely impacted the performing arts industry, Faridah's resilience shone through. She continued to produce, direct, and act in plays, including one in a Chinese dialect, bringing joy to theatre enthusiasts even in difficult times. Her leadership has been instrumental in shaping the trajectory of Malaysian theatre, inspiring countless individuals to pursue careers in the performing arts.

In 2020, Faridah took on the role of Adjunct Professor and Programme Development Director of TUTAS, Malaysia's first performing arts conservatory degree programme. Through this role, she continues to inspire and mentor the next generation of actors and artists, ensuring that her legacy will endure for years to come.

The play *Thunderstorm* she directed in Chinese dialect (Hokkien & Cantonese) was in 2019 before the pandemic. During the pandemic, she directed *Bollywood Dreams* (March 2021) – the first live show after five months, staged just 2 weeks after the official announcement by MKN which is a feat after transnational / online rehearsals.

Achievements and Recognition

For nearly seven decades, Dato' Dr. Faridah Merican's illustrious career has been a testament to a lifetime dedicated to the arts. Her impressive portfolio includes approximately 1,500 productions and performances, spanning various genres and showcasing both existing classics and innovative original works. Among her many accolades, she has been recognized with numerous prestigious awards, including the Elite@ UM Fellow in 2023, the Honorary Doctorate of the Arts from Taylor's University in 2018, and the Lifetime Achievement Award at the Boh Cameronian Arts Award ceremony in 2004.

DATO' FARIDAH: PERSONAL PERSPECTIVES

How do you see Arts play a role in shaping who we are as a nation?

Well, we have always believed that we have a big responsibility in the Arts, and that's why we train our kids from 3 years old to 70 and beyond. It is not an easy task to do. We have been striving for years and years and years and we are, I think we are kind of succeeding, not entirely because we're still telling our students what it means to be a cultured person, a person who believes in the arts, a person who tells the truth. We emphasise on this quite a bit about the truth of what we are and who we are and who our friends are and who are neighbours are and it is such a long road. And I'm not saying that we may even achieve our goals, but we will never give up.

What are those goals?

Our goal is to create a cultured society. We want to share with Malaysians, the whole learning of what it means to be cultured and some people might think I am a bit harsh to say things like that, but I think that it does not mean that culture is just the arts, culture is our lives, totally.

Everything that we do, everything that we touch, everything that we speak, everything that we utter with one another, that is the culture that we want to leave behind to our children, so that we become better. We become a better race of people.

Having been in the field since the 1950s, how do you see Malaysia's arts industry evolving in the next few decades?

My best years off Malaysia were the years, when I was growing up in Penang and with our first Prime Minister Tunku Abdul Rahman. It was so wonderful. I am not a university graduate, but the amount of things I learned because I sat together with intelligent people who talk about what they have learned, during their troubles - people like Syed Alwi and Usman Awang and others. However, that opportunity to sit together with people who will share with us their learnings, their intelligence is much reduced today. I just wish we could have more of these - so that the knowledge is passed down from one generation to the next.

What would you say to be your legacy for the performing arts?

I will not rest until I see a theatre at every street corner in Malaysia. I do not think it is going to happen, but I still wish there was a widespread performing arts throughout the country. At the moment, it is just in Kuala Lumpur or in Penang or a little bit in Malacca, a little bit in Johor. I used to say that street theatre is something that we should inculcate, we should create, we should develop, we should encourage, and it happens in many cities in the world, Street Theatre. I think it is great fun. I think that your children will enjoy it, even adults can enjoy it. So my legacy is I want to see theatre develop and develop and do not stop developing.

In the old old days, when traditional theatre was happening, there was Mak Yong, Bangsawan and Boria and everything and that was how theatre developed. When I was growing up, I was watching Chinese Wayang and Bangsawan in Penang, at the theatres that we had, looking over the fence of the theatre.

There's a lot of talent in the country, a lot who are willing to share their joys of performing with the people in the country, all we need to do is just click your finger, make it happen.

Bridging Science and Policy for Climate Action



As a geologist, professor, and research fellow at Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia, her work over the past two decades has cemented her status as Malaysia's leading expert in climate change. But her contributions extend far beyond academia; they reach into the realms of policy-making, disaster risk reduction, and community engagement. Dr. Joy's career is a testament to the power of translating scientific data into meaningful action.

Translating Science into Action

Dr. Joy's unique strength lies in her ability to navigate the complex interface between science and policy. As the Chairperson of the Malaysian Network for Research on Climate, Environment, and Development (MyCLIMATE), she has dedicated herself to making scientific data on climate change accessible and actionable for both the public and policymakers. Her work focuses on critical areas such as disaster risk reduction and sustainable development, ensuring that the evidence of climate change is not just understood but acted upon.

Her research serves as a cornerstone for advocating adaptation strategies and influencing policy-making. Dr. Joy's leadership is recognized through her roles on various panels and councils, both locally and internationally. Her ability to communicate complex scientific concepts in a way that drives action has made her an invaluable asset in the fight against climate change.

Impact and Global Leadership

Dr. Joy's contributions have not gone unnoticed on the global stage. For over a decade, she has been an active member of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC), contributing to numerous working groups and reports. Her dedication to shaping the climate change discourse led to her historic election in 2023 as the first female Asian co-chair of the IPCC Working Group III on Mitigation of Climate Change. In this role, Dr. Joy has provided a comprehensive perspective on mitigation and adaptation efforts, influencing global assessments and policy.

Dr. Joy has also been a key figure in the United Nations Office for Disaster Risk Reduction's (UNDRR's) Asia-Pacific Science and Technology Advisory Group (AP-STAG). This group supports science-based decision-making to implement the Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction, a global initiative aimed at understanding vulnerabilities, investing in resilience, and preparing for disasters in the face of climate change.

Pioneering Disaster Risk Reduction Initiatives

One of Dr. Joy's most notable contributions is her work in disaster risk reduction. As the Director of the Asian Network on Climate Science and Technology (ANCST) at UKM, she has led several transformative projects. Among them is the Kuala Lumpur Multi-Hazard Platform (KL-MHP), a groundbreaking forecasting system designed to provide early warnings and enhance preparedness and response mechanisms in urban areas. This system, in use by the City Hall of Kuala Lumpur (DBKL) since 2021, integrates data on weather, geological, and atmospheric hazards, offering a comprehensive approach to disaster risk management.

Dr. Joy also spearheaded the development of the MyBahaya Platform, which aims to foster social entrepreneurship among early-career geologists. This platform empowers geologists to monitor and report on geohazards, such as landslides, and engage with communities to build resilience against climate-induced disasters. By nurturing the next generation of geologists, Dr. Joy is ensuring that the field of disaster risk reduction continues to evolve and adapt to new challenges.

A Legacy of Mentorship and Academic Excellence

For nearly 30 years, she has been a principal research fellow at UKM's Southeast Asia Disaster Prevention Research Initiative (SEADPRI-UKM), where she has supervised the research of over 40 graduate students and postdoctoral candidates. Her mentorship has helped shape the careers of many scientists who are now contributing to climate change research and policy on a global scale.

Dr. Joy's academic achievements are reflected in the numerous awards she has received, including the Malaysia Research Assessment (MyRA) Excellence Award. Her work has been published in top-tier journals, and she continues to serve as an editor for several international scientific publications.



PROFESSOR DR. JOY: PERSONAL PERSPECTIVES

How do you feel about winning the Merdeka Award in your category?

It is such a pleasure to have my work recognised. I feel that I am making a positive difference to society and the environment, specifically in bridging the science-policy gap in climate change and building disaster resilience for sustainable development. This acknowledgment is also important to show my family, friends and colleagues that their faith and support to me has not been in vain.

Can you briefly share with us your professional experiences?

I have built my career on environmental geology, working primarily on earth resources and natural hazards, to channel scientific findings into policy. After obtaining my first degree in Earth Science from Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia, I was granted the British High Commissioners Award, now known as the Chevening Award, to continue my Masters in Mineral Exploration and Mining Geology from University of Leicester. I then embarked on my Ph.D. in University of Malaya working on gold mining and environmental impacts.

On the recommendation of Emeritus Prof. Dato' Ibrahim Komoo, I joined the Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia's Institute for Environment and Development (LESTARI) in 1996 and moved on to the Southeast Asia Disaster Prevention Research Initiative (SEADPRI-UKM), where I started leading multi-country international projects. Over the years, I have been privileged to work with scientists from multidisciplinary backgrounds in UKM, Malaysia and other countries, and channel the findings to policy makers and practitioners.

What is the one accomplishment you're most proud of? Why?

I am most proud of the project that I jointly led with Professor Lord Julian Hunt of Trinity College, Cambridge, involving scientists, practitioners and policy makers from Malaysia and United Kingdom, which delivered the Kuala Lumpur Multi Hazard Platform.

Professor Hunt is an atmospheric scientist, and I am a geologist, and together we conceptualised and the first ever forecasting system of its kind, combining information on weather, geological and atmospheric hazards for cities, funded by the Newton Ungku Omar Fund. The Kuala Lumpur Multi Hazard Platform was launched by the Mayor of Kuala Lumpur in 2021 and is now used by the City Hall of Kuala Lumpur, with operational support from the Meteorology Department of Malaysia (MetMsia).

What are your best memories throughout your career?

My best memories are the collaborative initiatives on climate change that I led involving scientists, practitioners and policy makers from Malaysia and other countries. In addition to delivering substantial products, there was always very high energy, excitement and so much learning in each of the initiatives. I could feel myself gaining experiential knowledge throughout its duration. The initiatives were instrumental in providing me with the credibility to join the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) and contribute to several IPCC Reports since 2014.



What is your personal philosophy?

I have always strived for continuous improvement in my work and my being.

I have two quotes that I stick in my annual planner to inspire me. The first is attributed to Winston Churchill "Success is not final; failure is not fatal; it is the courage to continue that counts".

Another anonymous quote also deeply resonates with me "When you encounter setbacks and difficulty, be practical and rational, not sentimental or emotional".

On the personal front, I am a work in progress. I admire humble, respectful and wise people. I have simplified these characteristics for better understanding, to make it part of my being. Gratitude is the pathway to humility. Respect is listening to another person, the one in front of you. Wisdom is patience, understanding, acceptance and contextual appreciation.

A pivotal moment of my career was when I delivered a keynote on IPCC findings at the inaugural bipartisan Symposium on Climate Change on 5 Sept 2022, which was officiated by the Speaker of the Parliament of Malaysia.

A major international moment was when I was elected as Co-Chair of the IPCC Working Group on Mitigation of Climate Change, after serving as Vice Chair of the IPCC Working Group on Impacts, Adaptation and Vulnerability.

What has kept your passion in this specific field for so many years?

Making a positive difference to safeguard communities and build their resilience. I am driven by the potential impact of my work on society and the environment. Every project I undertake, every collaboration I engage in, is guided by the goal of contributing to sustainable development and disaster resilience. The satisfaction of seeing tangible results and knowing that my efforts are helping to create a safer, more sustainable world keeps me passionate and motivated in this field.

Message to young Malaysians what is your personal philosophy or quotes

Work hard, give praise generously, avoid conflict and always enlarge the pie – don't fight over the biggest slice. Rank and recognition that is publicly awarded is nice but tends to be quickly forgotten, influence is more important. Always enlarge your circle of influence.

Visionary Leadership in Healthcare

Tan Sri Dato' Dr. Abu Bakar Suleiman has profoundly shaped Malaysia's healthcare system through visionary leadership and relentless dedication. His journey from the sole nephrologist in the Ministry of Health to a national healthcare pioneer exemplifies his commitment to improving patient care, accessibility, and medical innovation.

Pioneering Nephrology in Malaysia

Dr. Abu Bakar's career began with a pivotal role in nephrology. As the sole nephrologist in the Ministry of Health, he recognized the urgent need for accessible dialysis services across Malaysia. His work at Hospital Kuala Lumpur (HKL) laid the foundation for decentralizing nephrology services, making hemodialysis accessible to more patients nationwide.

To address the challenge of centralizing services at HKL, Dr. Abu Bakar developed strategies to decentralize and expand dialysis services. He established satellite dialysis units in major towns and supported local physicians in setting up peritoneal dialysis units, reducing the need for patients to travel long distances. His innovative approach to self-care dialysis empowered patients to manage their treatment at home or work, significantly improving their quality of life. This initiative not only expanded treatment accessibility but also provided a cost-effective model for developing countries facing similar healthcare challenges.

Championing Professional Development and Patient Empowerment

Dr. Abu Bakar's career began with a pivotal role in Dr. Abu Bakar's commitment to strengthening the healthcare system extended beyond technological advancements. As the President of the Malaysian Medical Council (MMC) in 1997, he introduced mandatory Continuous Medical Education (CME) to ensure that doctors remain updated on medical advancements. This initiative was a significant step toward improving patient care and professional accountability.

Additionally, Dr. Abu Bakar was instrumental in establishing the National Specialist Registry (NSR) in 2000. Managed by the MMC, the NSR created a public database of qualified specialists, enhancing transparency, safeguarding public health, and empowering patients in their healthcare choices. By requiring ongoing CME participation for NSR inclusion, the registry ensured that specialist clinicians maintained their knowledge and competence throughout their careers.

A Lifelong Dedication to Medical Education

After retiring from government service in 2001, Dr. Abu Bakar transitioned to be the President of the International Medical University (IMU). During this time, he guided the institution to launch healthcare services that benefited the community while supporting clinical training. His efforts at IMU have left an enduring legacy, fostering the next generation of healthcare professionals and ensuring that they are equipped with the knowledge and skills to navigate the challenges of modern healthcare.

Leadership in Healthcare Innovation

In 1987, Dr. Abu Bakar became the Director of Medical Services at the Ministry of Health, overseeing 130 hospitals nationwide. His leadership was instrumental in advancing healthcare policies and systems. As the Director-General of Health from 1991 to 2001, he spearheaded several groundbreaking initiatives, including the development of the Telehealth Blueprint.

Appointed by the then-Prime Minister in 1996, Dr. Abu Bakar led a national task force to modernize Malaysia's healthcare system. The Telehealth Blueprint, launched in 1997, envisioned a patient-centered approach to healthcare, emphasizing the importance of electronic health records (EHRs), teleconsultations, and remote access to health information.

The Blueprint's successful implementation included the adoption of a paperless and filmless system at Selayang Hospital and Putrajaya Hospital, showcasing the practical benefits of health IT in government healthcare facilities. Despite facing challenges during the Asian financial crisis and technological hurdles, the Blueprint continues to influence Malaysia's digital health initiatives, especially in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic. countries facing similar healthcare challenges.

Global Contributions and Ongoing Impact

On the global stage, Dr. Abu Bakar represented Malaysia in various health committees, contributing to discussions at the World Health Assembly and the WHO Western Pacific Regional Committee. His dedication to public health continued even in retirement, as he took on advisory roles, including as a member of the COVID-19 Expert Advisory Group.

Dr. Abu Bakar's lifelong contributions to healthcare were recognized with numerous accolades, including the Lifetime Achievement Award from the College of Physicians, Academy of Medicine of Malaysia in 2017, and an Honorary Doctor of Medicine from the International Medical University in 2023. These honors reflect his enduring influence on Malaysia's healthcare landscape.



A Lifelong Commitment

TAN SRI DATO' DR. ABU BAKAR: PERSONAL PERSPECTIVES

How do you feel about winning the Merdeka Award in your category?

I was pleasantly surprised and gratified that the work that I had been involved in from some years ago would receive such recognition.

Gratified because there is only so much that any one individual can contribute, but it had been the contributions of many that worked with me, that really mattered.

I had the privilege of working with many highly committed and dedicated colleagues, including the specialists, medical officers, nurses, medical assistants and others that made up teams that made contributions to the health services in our country. I represent them in receiving this award.

What has kept your passion in this specific field for so many years?

I have been blessed to be involved in work that interested me and through which contributions to the health system is possible. Healthcare and education are so intertwined, that working in Education after retirement from the Ministry of Health was a natural process. Working with younger people and to facilitate their development into future leaders is a great privilege.

What are your best memories throughout your career?

There have been many good memories.

I had referred a number of my patients to nephrologists in several countries, when they moved to join their families living abroad. In one case, I had given advice to the patient and family and communicated with a nephrologist who would continue her care. Three years later her son took the trouble, while on a visit here, to see me to express his mother's and his family's appreciation for my advice that helped them to cope with, and accept the continuing care for the mother in Canada.

In 1985 when I was President of the Malaysian Society of Nephrology, we hosted the Asian Colloquium in Nephrology in Kuala Lumpur. We arranged for three events to run concurrently with the main conference which included a two week course in Nephrology for specialist trainees in Nephrology and a three day training course for nurses and medical technicians. Delegates from all over Asia attended the training courses and the main conference. The leadership of the International Society of Nephrology who attended the conference were very impressed at this arrangement, and decided to continue the two week training course in Nephrology to be held together with their International Congress in Nephrology. This practice has continued to this day.



Have you ever met a role model that you thought was highly inspirational?

I am proud of developing the Nephrology services, including renal. The person I idolised the most was my late father who was generous, kind and instilled in me a love for reading and emphasised the importance of education. His advice and expectations shaped my outlook and value system.

However, professionally the person I admired was the late Dato' Dr Lim Kee Jin, with whom I worked as a house doctor and later as medical registrar. He was always professional, courteous and kind to all his patients. He had great clinical problem solving skills and was committed to continuous learning. There were a lot of learning activities working in his department, during ward rounds, and also journal reading sessions, tutorials, lectures and case presentations after office hours, five days a week.

All these encouraged doctors working with him to study for post graduate qualifications, and at the same time attend the post graduate course in Internal Medicine at the National University of Singapore. I was one of many that succeeded in obtaining my specialist qualification while working with him. aspects of quality in the clinical services in the Ministry of Health.

I had viewed the development of nephrology services and the initiatives on quality as one accomplishment.

What is the one accomplishment you're most proud of? Why?

I am proud of developing the Nephrology services, including renal transplantation at Hospital Kuala Lumpur, and in extending the Nephrology services to hospitals outside Kuala Lumpur, while being the sole kidney specialist in the Ministry of Health at the time. I had to run nephrology clinics in various general hospitals by making regular visits to these hospitals. I had also started Haemodialysis units in these hospitals and supervised them from Hospital Kuala Lumpur. The staff in these haemodialysis units were trained at Hospital Kuala Lumpur.

In the early 1980s, kidney specialists who spent two years working with me and a year overseas, were then posted to these hospitals and to run the nephrology services there. Training programmes for medical officers and for nurses were organised on an annual basis.

While starting the nephrology services, I also started a system approach to quality improvement in the nephrology services. In 1983 when the Ministry of Health initiated their national Quality Assurance Programme, they found that the nephrology services was the only clinical service that had any form of quality programme. I was then appointed to chair the National Technical Committee for Quality for the patient care services, I later came to chair the National Committee for Quality Assurance in the Ministry of Health as Director General. I had taken the approach for the specialist doctors running clinical services to take responsibility for quality. This resulted in the clinical specialists to become champions and experts in different aspects of quality in the clinical services in the Ministry of Health.

I had viewed the development of nephrology services and the initiatives on quality as one accomplishment.

Message to young Malaysians what is your personal philosophy or quotes

The youth of Malaysia as with the youth in other countries face challenging times in so many ways. However, this is a time of rapid, rapid change, with an abundance of opportunities. We all need to work to leave the education system and health system of last century, and build the new education system and health system of this century.

The challenges of artificial intelligence (AI) and synthetic biology may be daunting, but the potential for good to be tapped will be important for the health system and education system of the future.


A Leading Voice in Economic Policy

Jomo's influence extends far beyond Malaysia's borders. After the historic 2018 Malaysian general election, he was appointed as one of the five members of the Council of Eminent Persons. The council advised the new government on economic and financial matters during the transition. From 2019, he continued his advisory role as part of the Economic Action Council (EAC), chaired by then Prime Minister Tun Dr Mahathir Mohamad.

Throughout his career, Jomo has authored over 50 books, edited more than 50 volumes, and written numerous academic papers and media articles. His prolific output reflects his deep commitment to advancing socioeconomic development and sharing his insights with a global audience. Besides writing for other media, he has contributed over 400 opinion-editorials to the Inter-Press Service, covering a wide range of topics related to development, globalisation, human rights, and environmental issues.

Revitalizing Global Economic Policy at the United Nations

One highlight of Jomo's career was his tenure as Chief Economist of the United Nations, where he served as Assistant Secretary-General for Economic Development from 2005 to 2012. During this time, he revitalised the UN's presence in global economic policy discourses, particularly in response to the 2008 global financial crisis. As a member of the Stiglitz Commission, he helped shape government responses to the crisis, advocating policies that promoted financial stability and economic recovery.

Jomo also served as honorary Research Coordinator for the G-24 Intergovernmental Group on International Monetary Affairs and Development. He was also asked to serve as advisor to the President of the 63rd United Nations General Assembly, Father Miguel d'Escoto. Thus, while at the UN, he helped shape the global response to the financial crisis.

Eradicating Poverty and Malnutrition

Jomo's dedication to creating a more equitable and prosperous world is further evidenced by his work on eradicating poverty and hunger. He played a key role in facilitating an outcome for the 2nd UN Financing for Development Conference in Doha in 2008. He convened the 2nd International Conference on Nutrition in Rome in 2014, underscoring his commitment to addressing global malnutrition and associated challenges. This plan promotes coordinated efforts across key areas, including sustainable food systems, universal healthcare coverage, and social protection.

Championing Sustainable Development

Jomo's contributions to global development are perhaps best exemplified by his role in formulating the UN's Global Green New Deal. During the 2008-2009 global financial crisis, the UN recommended policies to achieve economic recovery, eliminate poverty, enhance ecological sustainability and reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

In addition, Jomo contributed to the UN General Assembly adoption of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) in 2015. These goals, which serve as a comprehensive framework for sustainable development worldwide, were later integrated into Malaysian five-year plan documents and various medium to long term vision statements. His intellectual leadership played a significant role in the transition from the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) to the more comprehensive, robust and legitimate SDGs.


Scholarly Excellence

Jomo's contributions to economic thought have been widely recognized and celebrated. He was the first scholar not from the US or Japan to receive the Abe Fellowship in 1993, a testament to his groundbreaking research and thought leadership. In 2007, he was awarded the Wassily Leontief Prize for "Advancing the Frontiers of Economic Thought".

His influential writings cover a wide range of topics, from international economic issues to Malaysian development challenges. Some of his notable works include Rents, Rent-Seeking and Economic Development, Globalization Versus Development, The New Development Economics and After The Storm: Crisis, Recovery and Sustaining Development in East Asia. His deep insights into Malaysia's economic and social landscape are reflected in titles such as A Question of Class, Privatizing Malaysia, Malaysia's Political Economy and Malaysian Eclipse.

His contributions to socio-economic development, in Malaysia and beyond, are a testament to his intellectual dynamism and commitment to social justice. His work has not only advanced the frontiers of economic thought, but also had tangible impact on policies and development initiatives worldwide.

As a scholar, advisor, and thought leader, Jomo continues to inspire and influence younger generations of economists and policymakers, especially in the Anglophone Global South. He remains unwavering in his dedication to advancing socio-economic development and fostering a more equitable and sustainable future.



EMERITUS PROFESSOR DR JOMO: PERSONAL PERSPECTIVES

What is the one accomplishment you're most proud of? Why?

Mooting the idea of a Global Green New Deal. Although clumsy as a slogan, it offered the prospect of a strong and just economic recovery after the 2008 global financial crisis while addressing sustainability challenges.

What is the biggest challenge you had to face throughout your working experience?

Negotiating to secure multilateral consensus on the urgent need to fight malnutrition while meaningfully securing the right to food for all.

How did you overcome the challenge?

By making compromises on peripheral issues while securing the needed multilateral consensus on issues key to addressing malnutrition.

Have you ever met a role model that you thought was highly inspirational?

Nelson Mandela, whom I met in 1994 after the ANC had won the election and just before his inauguration as president. I was inspired by his ability to work with those who had persecuted and oppressed him for decades in the larger national interest.

What is your personal philosophy?

To uphold truth and do no harm.


What has kept your passion in this specific field for so many years?

The continuously expanding scope for myth-busting.

What is your life motto?

Well, I have not had a single motto in life, but my school slogan at the Military College was not bad, namely "Serve to Lead". All too often, people believe they deserve to lead, that leadership has been thrust upon them or inherited due to merit.

It is important to recognise that leadership is most appreciated when it is earned through service to others.



How do you see Malaysia evolving in the near future?

It is important for us, not just Malaysians, but people all over the world, to develop a greater sense of empathy for others.

We are now perhaps more divided than ever. Many recent trends promote our distinctive and separate identities, rather than enhance our common humanity. This is most unfortunate, but not irreversible. Responsible leadership can contribute much. In Malaysia now, unfortunately, the incentives, particularly for political advancement, is to stress differences. Hence, we tend to draw boundaries rather than strive to transcend them to overcome our differences.

Never before have I felt that humanity, and the humanity of Malaysians, is under serious existential threat. There are many people ready to go to war on the slightest of pretexts and the slimmest of excuses. This is very dangerous, not only for them, but also for us all. Conflicts can easily spiral out of control as our means of mutual destruction have become more potent than ever before.

Besides the usual criteria for progressive social, economic and political changes, we need to do much more to create the conditions for peace and cooperation. When people greet one another, the typical greeting is one of peace, Salam and so on. We must be sincere about this and let this commitment shape our relations to others, all others. This has many implications for everyday life.

Transforming Education for Marginalized Children in Sabah

Dr. Kathryn Anne Rivai, originally from New Zealand, has dedicated over four decades of her life to improving education for marginalized children in Sabah, Malaysia. Her journey, beginning in 1977, has significantly impacted the education landscape in the region, particularly for undocumented children who often lack access to basic educational opportunities.

A Journey Rooted in Commitment

Dr. Kathryn's connection to Sabah began in 1977 when she moved to the state after marrying a Sabahan native. Starting as a secondary school teacher in Kota Kinabalu in 1978, she quickly advanced into leadership roles, serving as Deputy Principal and Acting Principal at Maktab Nasional, a private school. Her experience and dedication led her to establish primary schools like Datuk Simon Fung in 1998 and Seri Insan in 2004, both of which were registered under the Ministry of Education. These early initiatives set the stage for her lifelong mission to improve education for all children in Sabah.

A Life-Altering Encounter

In 2009, Dr. Kathryn had a life-altering encounter that would shape her future endeavours. A request from a timber mill and plantation to start a school exposed her to the harsh reality faced by many children in Sabah. These children, often undocumented and living in poverty, were deprived of their fundamental right to education. This experience ignited Dr. Kathryn's passion for advocating for these marginalised children and led her to establish Etania Schools in 2009.

Etania Schools: A Beacon of Hope

Etania Schools, formally registered under the Persatuan Pendidikan Kanak-Kanak Matakana Sabah by the Registry of Societies (ROS), have become a beacon of hope for marginalised children in Sabah. For nearly 15 years, Dr. Kathryn has tirelessly worked to provide quality education to these children, many of whom live in palm oil plantations and rural areas. With 14 schools under the Etania umbrella, over 1,000 students aged 5 to 18 have benefited from the education and life skills training provided by Etania.

Dr. Kathryn has pioneered a unique curriculum at Etania, emphasising academics, life values, and essential living skills. This approach ensures that students are well-equipped to contribute effectively to society, fostering a sense of responsibility, leadership, independence, and empathy. The impact of this curriculum is evident, with over 10 students having graduated from university by 2023, and many others succeeding in various vocations.

Addressing Socio-Economic Challenges

Understanding the socio-economic challenges faced by marginalised communities, Dr. Kathryn expanded her focus to include vocational training, aiming to enhance livelihoods and foster self-reliance. One of the notable initiatives under her leadership is the Model Vegetable Farm project, launched in 2020. This project, involving 60 families across three schools, provided training to Etania students on starting and maintaining vegetable farms. The initiative has since expanded to include fish farms, benefiting even more families and helping them sustain themselves during challenging times, such as the COVID-19 pandemic.

Another innovative project is the Aquaponics Programme, launched in 2023 with sponsorship from Calls Over Ridges, a Taiwanese NGO. This program teaches children sustainable farming methods, ensuring food security for their families in the face of increasing water scarcity and rising temperatures in Sabah. The Etania Sewing Programme, launched during the pandemic, has also empowered women by providing them with the skills to generate extra income through sewing, benefiting 30 families across two schools, with plans to expand further.

Collaborations and Expanding Impact

Dr. Kathryn's strategic approach to fostering partnerships with community members and local and international organisations has broadened Etania's impact and enhanced the quality of education provided. Collaborations with entities like UNICEF and Me.Reka have introduced valuable digital skills training to Etania students since 2018, including computer literacy, coding, and robotics. These skills open up new income opportunities for students, including remote work and employment at community computer centres.

Looking ahead, Dr. Kathryn is preparing to launch a new life skills centre in Kota Kinabalu in mid-2024. This centre will offer programs that emphasise skills training, including computer skills, sewing, baking, electronics, and business skills. The centre will serve not only Etania alumni but also graduates from other learning centres, preparing them for future occupations and ensuring they have the skills necessary to succeed in their chosen fields.

Championing Teacher Training

Recognizing the importance of well-trained educators, Dr. Kathryn established the Coalition of Learning Centers Sabah in 2015. This initiative has successfully implemented annual cost-free training programs for educators, equipping them with the resources needed to address the psychological impact of marginalisation on students. These programs have trained hundreds of educators, including 70 in early 2024 alone, ensuring that the next generation of teachers is well-prepared to meet the needs of their students.

Achievements and International Recognition

Under Dr. Kathryn's leadership, Etania Schools have gained international recognition for their contributions to education. In 2020, the Junior Chamber International (JCI) Malaysia Chapter honoured Etania Schools with the Sustainable Development Award, specifically recognizing their contributions to SDG 4 (Quality Education). They also received the 'Best of the Best' Overall Award for their educational programs targeting marginalised communities.

Etania Schools also received the Singapore President Award in 2020 for the sustainable design of the Etania Green School, a project that houses over 350 students in Beaufort, Sabah. Constructed in collaboration with Singapore-based NGO Billion Bricks, the school's environmentally friendly design, using recycled shipping containers and timber, has been recognized as a model for serving other underserved communities.

A Legacy of Dedication

Dr. Kathryn Anne Rivai has dedicated most of her life to serving the children of Malaysia, regardless of race, age, or creed. Her efforts to provide education and uplift marginalized communities are highly commendable. She is deserving of the Merdeka Award under the Outstanding Contribution to the People of Malaysia category, as her work continues to inspire and create lasting change in the lives of countless children.



DR KATHRYN: PERSONAL PERSPECTIVES

What is the biggest challenge you had to face throughout your working experience?

We have many challenges in the work we do now but I find the hardest and upsetting issue is when some people treat these marginalised children and their families with disdain and relegate them to the lowest ranking in society.

We know our students are known as the invisible children of Sabah because very few citizens want to know about them nor care for them and their welfare. In fact, our families are often even called derogatory names.

I think a re-education is needed in our society to issues like; what is humanity, what is equity and equality. Of course, a major challenge for our communities is how to get documentation. Many of our children have families that have been in Sabah for 3-4 generations and so this intergenerational statelessness creates many problems with documentation.

Another challenge is to equip our students with skills so they can provide for their families in the future and breaking the cycle of poverty.

How did you overcome the challenge?

The challenge has not fully been overcome. In our learning centres we focus on setting examples for the children of becoming a good person with good values contributing to society.

We encourage responsibility for one's own life, leadership and independence and empathy for others who are struggling in their lives.

Living skills like this occupy about 1/3 of our curriculum activities. Academic programmes occupy another 1/3 and 1/3 is devoted to living skills training.

What is the one accomplishment you're most proud of? Why?

Over the years there have been several awards for Etania from both national and international sources of which I am proud of and very thankful to the organisations and governments.

Yet, what I am most proud of is the way the students who have come from such a difficult background and face seemingly unsurmountable challenges, have withstood and with determination and grit have achieved great things.

I am proud of their achievements; going onto further studies; setting up businesses; acquiring good jobs and most of all becoming good people assisting in community development.



What is your personal philosophy?

Equity for all- in everything including children. Children must have access to a happy and fulfilling childhood the same as any child in the world. Every child must have the love, protection and care of a family and society. They must have opportunities to explore the world and find a career, they must have access to education, health care and nutritious food. My philosophy then is children are our future, let's give each one equal opportunity to succeed.

Being an academician, I used to be entirely focussed on a determined curriculum but over time I have learnt that preparation and learning for life is so much more relevant to our society today.

We need to educate our children and their families for skills to survive, skills to find their way through the labyrinth of the job market, how to work together, study smartly, be flexible and adaptable to future developments.

How can our marginalised communities sustain themselves? Clearly the number of marginalised people is increasing in our nation and in the world. I believe handouts do not have sustainability so we must think together for ways we can educate each of our families to take responsibility for their individual and collective lives.

Do you have a favourite quote that you live by?

"Just Do It." (Nike)

This has always been my favourite quote. If something needs doing then just do it for the benefit of the children and the school. I don't like wasting time, get the job done now. In my kind of work if we idle our time in implementing projects the children lose out. Too many repetitive meetings and talking simply loses precious time and we cannot predict how this loss affects our students.

Many people tell me not to work with the marginalised, just let them be.

But if we don't help them who will? There will be societal problems if a huge diaspora of people are left behind with no education and no way of earning a living. We must be fair and have equity amongst all human beings no matter their background.

I guess another favourite quote for me is "equity for all". The only differences amongst us are man-made. This has to change. We have to view humanity as one.

A Trailblazer in Investigative Journalism

lan Yee Ngan Fui, a multi-award-winning journalist, has left an indelible mark on society through his relentless pursuit of truth and justice. His work in investigative journalism, particularly in the areas of social justice and human rights, has set new standards in the field. As the leader of the R.AGE team at The Star newspaper and co-founder of The Fourth, Yee has consistently tackled some of the most pressing issues facing Malaysia and the region.

Transforming R.AGE: A Platform for Investigative Journalism

lan Yee joined R.AGE in 2006, when it was still primarily a youth and lifestyle platform. With support from award-winning journalist-producer Elroi Yee and a brave young team, lan helped transition R.AGE into a formidable platform for investigative journalism. Yee and his team began to report on issues that were often overlooked, such as unreported deaths in indigenous villages, sexual predators targeting children, human trafficking, refugee rights, and violence in schools.

One of the most significant projects under Yee's leadership was the "Predator in My Phone" documentary, which exposed child sexual groomers exploiting underage victims through popular chat apps. This exposé led to a successful public action campaign that lobbied for the passing of the Sexual Offences Against Children Act in 2017. The Act, which is still in operation today, has since protected numerous children from sexual exploitation, with over 300 suspects charged within the first year.

Campaigning for Kindness: #StandTogether

In 2017, in response to a series of tragic student bullying cases, Yee and his team at R.AGE launched the #StandTogether National Kindness Week campaign. Instead of taking the conventional route of anti-bullying measures, the campaign focused on promoting kindness and empathy. This innovative approach was endorsed by the Ministry of Education and received widespread support from organizations such as UNICEF, SP Setia, Digi, and Teach For Malaysia.

The campaign's impact was far-reaching, with involvement from 30 Members of Parliament and international expansion into the Kindness Leaders programme, reaching students across 11 countries. The United Nations highlighted the campaign as one of the 10 best examples of childinclusive interventions to end violence against children. families across two schools, with plans to expand further.

Exposing Human Trafficking and Drug Mule Syndicates

Yee and the team's commitment to uncovering social injustices continued with their work on the "Student/Trafficked" investigation, led by senior producer Elroi, which exposed human trafficking syndicates using fake colleges to bring victims into Malaysia and coerce them into forced labor. The investigation, which involved undercover journalism and hidden cameras, led to a police probe and the halting of these trafficking operations, potentially saving thousands of lives.

In 2020, Yee was also involved in investigating regional drug mule syndicates that were duping young Malaysians into transporting drugs into Hong Kong. The team's investigation helped lead to the arrest of four syndicate leaders and brought attention to the plight of the victims' families. The reporting even played a role in court cases in Hong Kong, with one of the mules eventually being acquitted and returned to Malaysia.

The Fourth: Defending Social Justice

In 2021, Ian Yee co-founded The Fourth, a media company dedicated to defending social justice through investigative journalism and impactful media campaigns. The Fourth's motto, "Berani kerana benar" ("Brave because of truth"), encapsulates Yee's approach to journalism. The company has produced over 70 videos and garnered more than 12,000 subscribers on its YouTube channel, all while maintaining a focus on social impact.

The Fourth also operates an academy that has trained over 1,000 participants, ranging from teenagers to veteran journalists. The academy offers a variety of courses and workshops, both online and in-person, with consistently high ratings. The team also provides on-site training in Orang Asli villages and refugee communities, further extending their impact.

International Recognition: Champion of Investigative Journalism and Social Justice

lan Yee's contributions to journalism have been recognized on a global scale. In 2021, he was appointed to the advisory committee for the Pulitzer Centre's Rainforest Journalism Fund, and he is among the first group of Malaysians to be selected as an Obama Foundation Leader. His work has also been featured at various international journalism conferences and in industry publications like the *Columbia Journalism Review*.

Yee's commitment to press freedom earned him the Global Press Freedom Teaching Award in 2023, and The Fourth was selected as one of 25 global changemakers for the UNLEASH incubator lab and conference in Rwanda.

Yee was most recently appointed as the resident investigative editor for the Asia Investigative Reporting Network (AIR Network), an international effort to strengthen investigative journalism in Southeast Asia. Yee is now in charge of coordinating cross-border investigations, developing training programs, and improving safety and security support for investigative journalists in the region.



IAN YEE: PERSONAL PERSPECTIVES

How do you feel about winning the Anugerah Harapan Merdeka in your category?

I just feel so grateful to the incredibly talented and courageous people I've worked with at The Fourth — and previously at R.AGE. Being investigative journalists can be a thankless task in Malaysia, especially with the risks and threats we face, so I'm glad we as a community can get this recognition.

What has kept your passion in this specific field for so many years?

Our investigations don't always succeed in driving change, but every once in a while, the people rally behind our campaigns and we get to make a real difference, the kind that saves lives and inspires hope. Those moments help.

What is the biggest challenge you had to face throughout your working experience?

The biggest challenge has been the mental toll of doing investigative work. Not only is it super demanding in terms of time and energy, there's also the various risks that come with the job. I think our team has done really well at mitigating those risks and looking out for each other, but I'm responsible for keeping everyone on the team safe, so that can take a toll sometimes.

And it's not just physical risks we have to deal with now.
Journalists everywhere are increasingly exposed to lawsuits
(especially frivolous Strategic Lawsuits Against Public
Participation (SLAPP)) suits designed to drain your money and
time), cyber attacks, online harassment, etc.

My job now is basically to raise funds and develop programs to ensure that investigative journalists can continue to do their critical work without fear or favour. It's been a huge challenge, but it's easy to stay motivated when the people you're working with are so courageous and impactful.



What are your best memories throughout your career?

After the Predator In My Phone investigation, we were invited to Parliament when the new laws against child sexual crimes were being debated. When the law was finally passed, I remember this wave of joy and relief just crashing down — and I could only enjoy it for about 10 seconds, because we had to rush across Parliament to interview Dato' Seri Azalina Othman Said, who had championed the bill as Minister of Law. That was a nice memory.

The other one was being able to bring the entire team to Bali for the Asian Media Awards ceremony, and us actually winning gold. We had some legendary parties there — and some not-so-productive brainstorming sessions. We had been nominated for our Student/Trafficked investigation (led by Elroi), which exposed how syndicates were using fake colleges in Malaysia to traffic young people into the country and coercing them into forced labor. That was another good example of impact-driven investigative journalism. It pushed the Higher Education Ministry to put an end to such practices, and we partnered with the Daily Star in Bangladesh to make sure students there were aware of these trafficking scams as well.

Finally, getting to meet Barrack and Michelle Obama and tell them about our investigative work was definitely a trip! I was selected for Obama's leadership program, and had a couple minutes of facetime with the former US president and First Lady during a community site visit. That was pretty surreal.


